MARLENE DOBKIN de RIOS, Ph.D., a medical anthropologist and Associate Clinical Professor of Psychiatry at the University of California, Irvine, has conducted extensive funded fieldwork with plant hallucinogens among contemporary populations of South America. She is author of *Hallucinogens: Cross-cultural Perspectives*, *Visionary Vine: Hallucinogenic Healing in the Peruvian Amazon*, and *Amazon Healer*, as well as more than 200 articles and book chapters.

HARRIET de WIT, Ph.D., Director of the Human Behavioral Pharmacology Laboratory at the University of Chicago, is an established researcher in the psychopharmacology of mood-altering drugs. She has served on several federal committees on the research and regulation of drugs, as well as on editorial boards of scientific journals in this field.

ROBERT JESSE serves as President of the Council on Spiritual Practices, which sponsors research on primary religious experience and its consequences. He has studied the issue of psychoactive substance use in religious settings from historical, religious, legal, and cultural perspectives. Through CSP, he has sponsored the drafting of a code of ethics for spiritual guides.

ROLAND R. GRIFFITHS, Ph.D., Professor of Behavioral Biology and Professor of Neuroscience at the Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine, is a distinguished research psychopharmacologist who also has a strong interest in spiritual practices.

RALPH W. HOOD, Ph.D., has extensive experience in test development and scientific assessment of religious experiences. He is senior author of the textbook *The Psychology of Religion: An Empirical Approach*, is a past Editor of the *Journal for the Scientific Study of Religion*, and a past President of Division 36 (Psychology of Religion) of APA.

HERBERT D. KLEBER, M.D., is Professor of Psychiatry and Director of the Division on Substance Abuse Research at Columbia University College of Physicians and Surgeons. He was Deputy Director for demand reduction under Bill Bennett in the White House Office of National Drug Control Policy, and he has been involved in treatment and research on drugs of abuse, including the hallucinogens, for over 35 years.

CHARLES R. SCHUSTER, Ph.D., has had a distinguished career in the field of psychopharmacology. Among many other credentials, he was Director of the National Institute on Drug Abuse under presidents Reagan and Bush, former Editor of *Clinical and Experimental Psychopharmacology* and *Drug and Alcohol Dependence*, and President of the College on Problems of Drug Dependence.
